

## Dear Participants of ChemCH 2018,

*“Our cultural and natural heritage is an irreplaceable source of life and inspiration. It is our legacy from the past, what we live with today, and what we pass on to future generations.”* (UK National Commission for UNESCO) It is therefore vital that cultural heritage should not be left to decay, deteriorate or even be destructed. Cultural heritage is, however, a very large and complex issue, constantly changing and chemistry has a multi-faceted rôle in its safeguarding, chemists being called to contribute to solving the challenges that face heritage today. The aim of the biennial congress ChemCH is to look to the future of an united Europe from the point of view of its Cultural Heritage. Thus, preservation of heritage assets exceeded the narrow boundaries of museographic tradition, becoming a living proof of a new European cultural policy, a sign of vitality and aspiration to build up a united Europe.

It is within this context that, on behalf of the Local Organising Committee, we welcome all ChemCH members and guests at ChemCH 2018 in Bucharest, once known as the Little Paris of the East, now a modern city developing at a tremendous rate. Based on more than 120 abstracts submitted to this congress, an exciting scientific programme with invited lectures, oral and poster presentations has been organised with the valuable support of the members of the International Board of ChemCH and the Scientific Committee.

Thanks to the substantial support of national and local institutions, cultural institutions and many private persons a rich cultural and social programme to foster interaction, mutual knowledge and building new relationships has been organised.
